Let us seek God's guidance in our worship today to help us learn to notice, respond, and care for our sisters and brothers who are hidden in plain sight, and suffering deeply.

We ask for God's help to better equip each one of us in our service of Him and to give us wisdom about how we can make our communities slavery free.





4. A CONFESSION

Lord Jesus Christ, we join our prayers with people across the world to ask for your guidance and grace, that we may learn to notice the unnoticed, especially those trapped in modern slavery. Bless all who work to fight this crime and bring freedom to those being exploited.

5. PRAYERS

6. IDEAS TO STRUCTURE CORPORATE PRAYER



TSP PRAYERS

For an All-Age service, you may like to structure your prayers, using the TSP abbreviation - Thank you, Sorry, Please. Thank God for his character, his love, his empowering. Say sorry for the ways we have contributed to people being exploited and overlooked. Say sorry for when we don't notice people or care about others. Ask God to bless our efforts to care for victims, bring slavery to an end, inspire and mobilise Christians to action.

CONCENTRIC CIRCLES

You could pray in concentric circles – for example, pray for our response, our churches, our country, our world. You may want to focus on initiatives you know about in your church, our country and our world. You may want to focus on a particular country or form of modern slavery.

CATEGORIES

You could pray under categories – pray for victims, for organisations and churches working with victims, for our politicians, for our response.

THE CLEWER INITIATIVE

Pray for the work of The Clewer Initiative – that God would use our efforts to mobilise many churches and communities and ultimately to identify and care for victims of modern slavery.





7. SERMON STARTER

Today's Bible passages are 2 Timothy $3\,v14$ - $4\,v5$ "Be persistent – proclaim the good news" and Luke $18\,v$ 1-8 "God will grant justice".

This week, people around the world, are observing International Anti-Slavery Day. Sadly, slavery was not totally abolished by William Wilberforce and others in 1807. In our times, we are witnessing a huge increase in modern slavery – more than 40 million people worldwide and many thousands in our own country.

The cause is a perfect storm: an increasing number of vulnerable people, desperate for money and work; a huge increase in part-time and agency work, which cannot be easily monitored; a massive demand amongst all of us for cheap goods and services – our concern is about the price not the people providing them; and a huge criminal network capturing and controlling people in order to make vast profits.

The churches have a key role. The Clewer Initiative is the Church of England's response to modern slavery and uses the strap line 'we see you'. Modern slavery is hidden – people like the widow in our gospel – crying out – but generally ignored by those in authority, and by most of the rest of us. Yet God longs to grant justice.

2 Timothy tells us to be persistent in our proclamation of the Gospel – good news for the poor and the oppressed. We have a message of hope and healing. We need to learn how to notice, how to respond, how to support and invite our exploited sisters and brothers to share in the blessings of God's love.

There is a challenge in today's gospel – will the Son of Man find faith on Earth? We are called to be people of faith – to believe in the good news for the poor and oppressed and then to act accordingly.

The Clewer Initiative provides some great resources – about spotting the signs, looking out for the homeless, helping young people and their families caught up in county lines, taking appropriate action to combat this terrible crime, and offering hope and grace to those being so cruelly brutalised.

Let us ask for God's guidance to be strong in our faith, to be persistent in proclaiming the good news for the poor and the oppressed, and to pledge ourselves to play our part in helping all of our communities to begin to take steps to become slavery free.





8. HOUSE GROUP SESSIONS — SEVEN LETTERS TO THE CHUCHES



Modern slavery is a worldwide phenomenon and expanding. It is growing because of a number of features which feed each other:

- the rise in the number of vulnerable people in the UK and across the globe
- an increasingly sophisticated criminal network offering false promises and trapping people in situations of brutal exploitation
- an indifference in many of us as to how our goods and services are provided or by whom. We are concerned about cheap prices, not the welfare of producers.

Modern slavery is a form of exploitation which is often hidden. Without citizens and consumers noticing, suspecting or asking questions, it is very difficult for law-enforcement agencies and businesses to know where to look or how to respond.

The Clewer Initiative calls Christians and all people of goodwill to become proactive and more fully committed to going the extra mile and seeking to notice and respond – whether inviting proper investigation of suspicious behaviours or deals too cheap to be true, or supporting victims, raising awareness and building community resilience.

This year, we are inviting you to "receive" the seven letters to the churches from the Book of Revelation — and to make them an opportunity for prayer, reflection, and the identification of appropriate action against modern slavery.

John wrote the seven letters at a time of great anxiety and uncertainty. Each church was in Asia — on the front line of the church's potential for sharing the Gospel in new cultures and contexts.

In your house group, we hope you will use the material to reflect on your individual and church response to the evils of modern slavery and exploitation. At the end of the seven weeks, we invite you to respond with a "return" letter. This will give you a focus and targets for effective mission, and enable The Clewer Initiative to identify how it can better serve the church and communities in the coming months.
